Martock & District Accounts Update



An Introduction to Megan Haldane the speaker on 11 June

Megan is part of the Cyber Team in the Serious and Organised Crime Investigations Team of Avon and Somerset Police. As we're aware from the television and other media, cybercrime is a huge problem on an individual and international scale and this is a very important subject for everyone. We can be affected by cybercrime individually (200,000 cases between June 2022 and May 2023) with an average loss of £4,500. But we can also be affected when businesses and charities that we have electronic contact with are affected by cybercrime.

Megan will talk about how we can help protect ourselves from being the victim of cybercrime, whether you use a mobile, computer or both.

June Facts and Legends ...

There are multiple theories as to what June was named after. One theory is that it was named after the Roman goddess of marriage, Juno. Another theory is that its name originates from the Latin word *iuniores*, which translates into 'younger ones'. Another possibility is that June was named after Lucius Junius Brutus, the founder of the Roman Republic. The Anglo-Saxons called the month 'Sera Monath' - dry month.

June is thought to be a good month to get married. One piece of lore is:

'Married in the month of roses — June Life will be one long honeymoon!'

There is also a lot of weather lore associated with June.

'A calm June puts the farmer in tune'

'June damp and warm, does the farmer no harm'.

In previous days, many villages and communities had well dressing events, particularly in Derbyshire. Well dressing is the art of decorating wells, springs and other water sources with pictures of growing things.

It is believed to date back to the Celts or even earlier.

The longest day in the UK this year is 20 June, midsummer day. The summer solstice will be at 03.41 on Saturday 21 June 2025.

June events include:

- On 2 June 1953, on a wet rainy day Queen Elizabeth II was crowned at Westminster Abbey
- Gruffydd ap Llewellyn, Welsh King of Gwynedd and Powys, defeated an English attack on 4 June 1039
- 6 June 1944, saw the D-Day invasion of Normandy by 1 million allied troops to liberate Western Europe from German occupation
- The first ever Oxford and Cambridge University boat race was won by Oxford on 10 June 1829
- On 13 June 1944, the first V1 flying bomb, or 'doodle bug' was dropped on London
- King John signed the Magna Carta on 15 June 1215 at Runnymede in Surrey, removing total authority from the monarchy forever
- On 18 June 1815, British and Prussian forces led by the Duke of Wellington and Gebhard von Blücher defeated Napoleon at the Battle of Waterloo, in Belgium
- William Penn, the English Quaker, signed a treaty with chiefs of the Lenni Lenape Tribe on 23 June 1683 in an attempt to ensure peace in his new American colony
