

#### October Facts and Legends ...

October was named by the Romans after 'octo', as it was the eighth month in the original calendar, before January and February were added to the year. The Saxons called the month 'Wyn Monath' - wine month — because it was the time of year to make wine.



The October flowers are cosmos and calendula (marigold). The birthstones are opal



and tourmaline.

The full moon on 6-7 October is known as the Hunter's Moon (previously Harvest Moon). A large, bright super moon helping hunters, hence its name. *October folk lore includes:* 

When deer are in a grey coat in October, expect a hard winter.

Much rain in October, much wind in December.

A warm October means a cold February.

In October dung your field, and your land its week.

Keep an eye out for the Draconid meteor shower in

the late evenings of October 6-10, and the Orionid meteor shower in the pre-dawn hours from 2 October to early November.

The Bavarian beer festival Oktoberfest takes place every year in Munich, Germany. The event has been held since 1810.

October events include:

- On 1 October 1949, the People's Republic of China was founded. Mao Zedong ruled the republic from its founding until his death in 1976
- Britain's first escalator opened on 4 October 1911 at Earl's Court underground station in London, connecting the District and Piccadilly platforms
- On 14 October 1066, Harold II, England's last Anglo
   -Saxon King was killed at the Battle of Hastings —
   supposedly because of an arrow in his eye
- British general Lord Charles Cornwallis surrendered to George Washington at Yorktown,
   Virginia on 19 October 1781, ending the American War of Independence (Revolution)
- On 25 October 1854, Lord Lucan led The Charge of the Light Brigade at Balaclava in the Crimean War
- The first television transmission of a moving image was made by Scottish inventor John Logie Baird on 30 October 1925
